



Program Overview

- **Program Name:** 4YOUTH outreach report
- **Date:** July 29th July 2026 – 16:00- 17:00
- **Location:** Portreath Village
- **Target Group:** Young people who are in the village at time of the visit.

The primary goal of this outreach initiative is to try and reduce anti-social behaviour in the village and sources ideas regarding what can be offered to engage young people. Also to encourage community awareness.

Key Achievements and Outcomes

- **Total Number of Participants:** 7 young people
- **Gender :** 5 boys 2 girls
- **Demographic :** Portreath, Camborne and Pool.
- **Ages :** Between the aged of 12 and 15

During our outreach session today, we engaged with several small groups of young people within the village. The groups were spending time together, relaxing and catching up with their friends. We took the opportunity to approach the young people in a friendly and informal manner, allowing for positive conversations and engagement within the community.

We promoted the upcoming summer activities and Chips and Chill sessions, providing young people with information about the opportunities available to them over the summer period. We encouraged them to get involved and explained that the sessions provide a safe, relaxed and positive environment where they can spend time with their peers, take part in activities and engage with youth workers. We also signposted young people to the relevant social media pages where they can access further information, including dates, times and details of upcoming sessions.



During our conversations, we discussed young people's plans for the summer and how they were feeling about the upcoming transition within school. This provided an opportunity for informal support and allowed us to check in with young people around any thoughts or concerns they may have about changes to their routines, friendships and education. We encouraged positive planning for the summer and reminded them that there are opportunities available locally should they wish to get involved.

We also used the opportunity to promote community responsibility and positive behaviour. We encouraged the young people to take responsibility for their surroundings and to collect and dispose of any litter appropriately. This was discussed in a positive and non-judgemental way, highlighting the importance of respecting the local environment and the wider community.

Following our conversations with the young people, we continued to walk around the remainder of the village as part of our outreach patrol. The village was particularly quiet, with very few young people visible in the remaining areas. We did not identify any concerns or issues during the remainder of the walk, and everything appeared calm and settled.

Overall, the session was positive, with good opportunities to engage with young people, promote upcoming activities and maintain positive relationships within the community. The young people we spoke with were relaxed and receptive to our engagement, and there were no concerns or incidents to report at the time of leaving the village.
