
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The end appears in sight as the hole is filled and presumably is now setting. The fence is still in place with a digger inside it.

So we are now in week 13 of the huge hole in the public walkway by the slipway in Portreath - just to repeat - week 13 since 29 April 2025.

#### As you know:

- on 19/6 Chris Jones from Cornwall Council offered assurance that the hollowed out new cave in the harbourside with 2 small pieces of temporary covering resting over the holes feels safe and secure from collapse to him.
- you can also see that we are assured that we need not worry that the flimsy bits of tape, temporary bits of fencing and several large plastic way-blockers may be thrown about by vandals exposing the big hole to pedestrians and the harbour to pollution.
- the thread below sets out some of the relationship between South West Water who dug the ground that exposed the void and Cornwall Council who are owners of the Statutory Harbour Estate.

 Chris offered assurance that surveying and planning for repair was in hand.

That was all lovely.

So here we are with the hole, the void and the Council installed orange and metal temporary detritus still in place on 21/7/25. The holiday visitor influx is very imminent and so obviously the risk is about to rise considerably.

Please may I have a new update on when the void will be filled and the risks fully ameliorated.



So other than surveying, nothing has actual happened and there is no date for it to happen? As I say we are 11 weeks in now, so when would it be reasonable for me to ask again if nothing continues to happen with what - as you say yourself - is a significant void in the walkway?

But the way, please don't take current assurance from the photo you mention because I did not add one. The photo that presumably is still attached to the thread is what I sent you on 18/6 in my first email.


Thank you for tour email, and accompanying photograph which confirms the site remains safe and secure. Initial inspections have been undertaken and contractors have attended site to quote for the repair.

As explained previously following excavation of the area to complete a repair South West Water found a significant void. This was reported to us and a contractor appointed to determine how extensive the repair work is. As you may already know there are many utilities in the area, and adjacent properties that we want to ensure are not impacted by further voiding and ultimately subsidence.

I can assure you a full repair is planned but I cannot give a timescale at this time.

The area falls within the Statutory Harbour Estate; we would not routinely report to a Parish or town Council from works undertaken on our estate but we do have a good relationship with Portreath and work closely with such defects. Of course if there is any vandalism please report this to us; sadly this is all too common across all our sites.

I will inspect the site on my way back from another location later

today but certainly when last inspected by the head of our Maintenance Team it was deemed as safe. The surveys may highlight further voiding and repairs required and we hope to know in coming days. Whilst it may look like there is no progress this is certainly not the case and this repair is rather more complex than just back filling.

That just leaves the issues of people vandalising the heavy loose items and the subsequent increased risk of people falling into the holes. As you all know, Portreath has a considerable antisocial behaviour problem in the summer months so these are not idle observations.

The Heras fencing was installed some time ago; believe when SWW left site having completed there works

Works being undertaken by SWW highlighted structural defects and voids and the area was left open whilst survey work was undertaken ahead of a repair proposal. This survey (including ground penetrating radar) was undertaken last week. When we last inspected the site it was safe and secure; we will re-visit to see the current status. The repairs are further complicated by the services to properties in the area.

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

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

As you obviously know, the harbourside was

dug up by South West Water 8 weeks ago on Tuesday 29 May. The huge holes are still there with some slight plastic attempts at excluding people falling into them arrayed around them. I attach a video but it doesn't show that beneath the 2 sheets over the hole, the harbourside is alarmingly currently hollowed out like a cave.


About a month ago SWW came to fill the holes with piped concrete but were stopped from continuing by a Cornwall Council harbour person as it was being done in a sloppy fashion and wasn't going to make the harbourside safe. Since then no one has done anything.

Pretty soon the summer influx of partying visitors jumping into the harbour will begin and I think it's inevitable that the plastic

fencing and bollards will end up being thrown in as happened last year when smaller amounts were left lying around.

Is there anything Portreath Parish Council can do to lean on SWW to liaise with Cornwall Council to agree a spec and get in with the repair before either someone falls or the harbourside deteriorates further or all the plastic tat gets thrown into the sea - or maybe all three?

I will copy this to Cllr Crawford as he may be able to help.
